Kappas BCDC Permit Renewal

The saga over the Kappas BCDC permit renewal continues. Many of you may have seen the recent article in the Chronicle regarding the bill in the State Legislature sponsored by Senator Carole Migden. The passage of this bill is essential to the Kappas permit renewal. Here is the background. The only major remaining issue to be resolved before the BCDC can consider the Kappas renewal application is fixing the "boats on streets" problem. This is basically where some homes at Kappas Marina sit partially on the State owned underwater streets. This same problem was fixed at WPH by the trading of privately owned Richardson Bay land for the land owned by the State of California. Kappas was intending to do the same thing when a State Appellate Court decision (on an entirely different subject) stopped the California State Lands Commission from proceeding with Kappas. Thus the need to change the law. Fortunately all parties involved (State Lands Commission, Attorney General, BCDC and Kappas) want the law passed. So assuming all goes well and Arnold signs the law, it will become effective on January 1, 2007. Until then, the permit renewal process is on hold.

CERTifiably Safe?

Surely you have wondered what you would do in case of earthquake, fire, or other such calamities. As an astute reader of Floating Times, you know that Community Emergency Response Training (CERT) is an excellent way to learn what to do during disasters.

On the weekend of June 3-4, another group of Floating Home Association members learned what we would do in cases of emergency. We received two days of CERT training that, in part, was specifically designed for the floating home community. Marin County Fire Captian Randy Engler and Firefighter Graham Groneman showed the 16 of us, including 12 from South Forty, how to prevent and suppress fires, basic search and rescue techniques, disaster first aid, and some gen-

Response to flooding home shows need for better emergency plans

It was a beautiful July Fourth, and the floating home was resting peacefully on the mud squirting water from the sides of its hull like an Italian fountain. No one lives there. The owner has moved out of the country, and the boat is for sale.

On that sunny Tuesday, three neighbors stared at the boat in disbelief. "Luther's hull is full of water" "Where is the realtor?" "Was she called?" One neighbor had noticed a water leak FOUR days before, and had left a message on the realtor's cell number as instructed, but got no return call. The neighbor was busy and let it go. Meanwhile, the boat was filling with water. Since the tides were only a little higher than the hull itself and the draft was only a few inches, no one else had noticed the problem.

One resident called the fire department for the pump, and another turned off the

inspect it. Crouching, barefoot, in the two inch-deep water, he cried out, "Turn off the electricity! NOW!" Smoke and sparks were coming off an electrical wire going to the water heater. NO ONE — not three trained CERTs, not three trained firefighters, nor anyone else had remembered to turn off the electricity! The house could have burned down, and well-meaning neighbors and firefighters could have been electrocuted in the hull or on the water soaked carpet.

How could this disaster have been prevented? How could it have been better handled when discovered? And how could the response be conducted more safely?

On the prevention side — the owner should have made arrangements with one or more neighbors to watch over the place and should have given a list of emergency call-numbers as well as information on how they could be reached. Trusted neighbors should have been given keys for entry. The owner should have installed metal-wrapped washing machine hoses. They're available at nearly all hardware stores. And there should have been a water-sensitive alarm placed in the hull. The *Floating Times* has run columns on these issues.

At the moment of discovery — the neighbor who first noticed a water leak immediately should have alerted other neighbors as well as the marina, the fire department. Both the realtor and the owner should have had a foolproof way to be reached.

And at the response — CERTs should have fully assessed the situation and the water, gas and electricity should have been shut off immediately before entering. Upon the fire fighters arrival, everyone should have stepped back and fully assessed the situation again. This illustrates the need for CERTs to keep their training up to date.

There are lessons here for everyone. Emergencies can and do happen, and they always surprise us. People make mistakes in the confusion of the action. This was a small disaster (for everyone but the owner) and fortunately no one was hurt, but the potential was great. Let's be better prepared for the next one.

water to the house. Since no one had a key, another neighbor climbed through an open window and unlocked the front door. The entire lower floor was underwater.

Firefighters brought our FHA gas-powered pump within a few minutes and began pumping. A fourth neighbor reached the realtor by leaving messages on both the main line and the cell phone, contrary to the message instructions. The cause of the flooding was found to be a burst washing machine hose, which filled the hull to overflowing.

After most of the water was pumped out, one resident went into the hull to

eral emergency preparedness measures.

The following will give you some idea of what we learned about household emergency preparedness. CERT training emphasizes that the key to surviving any disaster situation is planning. First, we can make our homes as safe as possible. Look at your home with "earthquake eyes." Examine each room for potential hazards and correct the problems. Keep in mind that falling glass is a major cause of injury in an earthquake. For example, don't place beds under windows. We live on the water and are accustomed to having our houses move, so, for us, it is particularly important that heavy furniture and appliances be secured. We need to think in terms of storms as well as earthquakes.

Most of us don't have a lot of room to spare for storing emergency supplies but we should store as much as we can. It is recommended that we each have enough supplies to last five days, including a gallon of water per person per day, easily prepared food, flashlights, medications, and a good first aid manual.

It's important to have a good plan of escape from each room in the boat to both the dock and the water. There should be a plan for reuniting household members. Decide where you will meet if household members are in separate locations. Select a telephone contact out of the area to use to find out if everyone is OK, relay messages, and set up an alternative meeting place.

And that was just the beginning

WATER YOU DOING HERE? *by the Dinghy Dame*

For this issue I needed help, so put out a May-Day to the dock reps and received several really neat responses which will keep me paddlin' my arse around these waters for months! Thank you all!!

Tony Williams, Main Dock rep, invited me to his place — Wolf Island!!! Who was he? El Lobo himself? I made some inquiries and found out three things before I gathered pen and paper for my adventure. He has lived here for 35 years. He plays softball, and his huge redwood galley table is suspended from the ceiling by chains!! Shiver me timbers, one could conjure up all sorts of scenarios!

Turns out that Wolf Island was named just that because the original builder/owner was one W.O. (Bud) Fensler. Thus, W.O.F. Island. Tony said that it was usually pronounced Wolf Island, so when he acquired it 20 years ago, he added the L, put up a sign, and made it his own.

Tony was born in Illinois. He moved to the Peninsula at age 12, then to the city where he finished high school at Gallileo. At that time he was building model ships and working at the Maritime Museum down the street repairing rigging for them, and scooping ice cream at the neighborhood Swensons. Then it was back to Illinois for college and a teaching career at the University where he taught Arts and Crafts.

Around 1970 he purchased a floating home in the present Kappas small boat harbor. In those days it was half houseboats, and half marina with pleasure boats and fishermen. Twas a happy hippy scene. When the fishermen came in on Sunday, Tony said, the cats would line up along the dock and there would be salmon for all, man and beast alike. He enjoyed life there for several years, and at that time was an artist for a design firm.

Soon, Kappas built East and West Piers, which had utilities, (they said) and Tony, along with the others, was relocated. Those who felt they were being forced to move, grouped together and formed the original FHA which was called the Sausalito Houseboat Association. And at that time, he says, most of them really were houseboats, and not floating homes which we have more of today. Tony, who was placed on the east side of East Pier, was bothered by the traffic noise, as well as the shallow depth of the harbor, so he bought himself a bachelor pad on Issaquah and found Wolf Island long after that.

Tony is a busy guy. In the '70s he opened a marketing and communications company called Design Vectors in San Francisco and he closed shop only two years ago.

His home is wonderful. He has maintained the original integrity of the builder, and there is wood, stained glass and whimsical stuff every place you look! One wall is covered by the ice cream scoop collection he started while dipping at Swenson's. He has model ships he built in that period of his life as well, and there are memories everywhere. I felt quite at home. His cat Sailor fell in love with my purse, and I enjoyed a Main Dock view and ambiance quite different from my own. Tony spoke lovingly of his wife Rusty and daughter Delta. Rusty is quite an artist, and Delta, who is still in high school, has written a book and hopes to go to UCLA film school!

Softball has long been a passion of Tony's and he currently manages one team in Corte Madera and plays on another one there, as well as one in San Rafael. He's an infield player, which one might expect. And he says it doesn't keep him away from his family as long as a game of golf would.

Tony likes our community and his backyard, where they enjoy their kayaks and cabin cruiser. He is still involved with local politics. He is CERT captain of the dock, is dock rep, and he worked hard getting the new permit for Waldo.

The committee that originally put together the Community Development Plan for Waldo met around his infamous redwood table, and County representatives, harbor people and co-op members alike sat and came to agreement in his home. That must be a good feeling.

Tony says that over the years the FHA meetings have changed. They are not battling in court now, and political stuff isn't as much of an issue. In the '70s, the issues on the docks were nudity, grass, dog poop, etc. Now they discuss whether or not there should be defibrillators for all of us old timers who have made this paradise our permanent home.

When I asked if he planned to stay here, Tony told me of his heroes, his aunt and uncle, who in their 90s still travel around the country in their large motor home, pulling their car. That would be about the only thing that could drag him away. At least we can expect him around and at bat for us for another 30 years or so. He's a great guy to have in OUR infield!!!
